MESSAGE FROM THE CAMPUS PRESIDENT

The Davis Applied Technology College reached its 30th anniversary on July 1, 2008. The institution has enjoyed a very rich history of providing quality and timely technical education services to our customers in the region. Our services and student opportunities have been greatly enhanced through the sixteen years of unparalleled support of our technical college by the Davis Applied Technology College Foundation. During a year of celebration, we will honor the role the Foundation has played in the unparalleled success of this institution.

Fiscal Year 2008 was another great year of support from the Foundation to the institution. During the second quarter of the year, we celebrated contributions from Dick Bowman and Haven Barlow, allowing us to supplement state funding to complete an extensive remodel of the culinary arts classroom, student cafeteria and student services area. We also formally broke ground for the 68,000 sq. ft. Haven J. & Bonnie Rae Barlow Manufacturing Technology Building slated to be completed in February 2009. Over \$720,000 in support from the Foundation, through its donors, provided the required assets making these two projects possible.

During the third quarter, the Foundation funded a new automated nursing lab through the generous donation of Michael Jensen of Davis Hospital and Medical Center through the Iasis Corporation Foundation. This substantial donation allowed nursing faculty to purchase

teaching simulators (SimMan) which reduces hospital clinical practice time by 25%. This state-of-the art facility also provides technology to teach the assessment of critical diseases not typically found in a hospital setting. In addition, funding was made available to create a surgical skills lab which will enhance training capabilities for surgical technology students.

During the fourth quarter, the institution received a community development block grant (CDBG) from Morgan County to acquire land for a business development/technical education building for the residents of Morgan City and the County. This project has great economic development capability for the citizens in this section of our region.

In behalf of the College Board of Directors, administration, faculty and staff, we offer our sincere appreciation to the Foundation for another year of tremendous achievement and for a record year of student scholarships and financial support for significant physical plant and programmatic improvements.

I offer my sincere thank you to each board member for their time and dedication in making the foundation successful.

It is with great appreciation to our generous donors that the College now has a fully-functioning Virtual Healthcare Training Center. This was made possible through a combination of efforts. Initially, the college saw the need for this center, provided the space and make adjustments to the facility while the Nursing program utilized funds in their budget to make enhancements to the space.

Private donors, IASIS, R. Harold Burton Foundation, Katherine and Ezekiel Dumke Foundation provided funds for the construction of the "hospital rooms" and purchase the mannequins with Laerdal offering discounts on the "virtual patients" in this healthcare center. Then another great partner, the Swanson Foundation provided beds, and continually restocks our supply closets.

With these combined efforts, we now have an incredible training facility that will prepare our students to a higher level, relieve a portion of the pressure on the hospitals for clinical times, address some of the nursing shortage, and become a center for continuing and upgrade training for healthcare professionals.



Scholarships - Needs continue to grow

As a core element in the mission statement of the Foundation, providing funding for scholarships is of primary importance. The Foundation wishes to provide funding as needed to insure educational opportunities for all students. Scholarship funding continues to be available for students with exceptional performance within specific skill areas, students with defined financial needs, and high school students with targeted completion during the summer after high school graduation. During the

past year, the Foundation made available \$120,000 for tuition and books to students enrolled at the College as well as for tuition waivers.

According to the latest Student Income Survey, nearly 70% of our adult students were in the low to moderate income level eager to move forward and become financially independent. As the enrollment of adult students continues to increase, now at approximately 70% of total enrollment, need for financial assistance continues to also increase.

REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY

Foundation Contribution

For the past fourteen years, the Foundation has hosted a scholarship golf tournament and experienced strong support from the community, college employees as well as the students. The Foundation is committed to providing scholarship funding for any student wishing to attend the college but unable to pay for the tuition. We would like to share with you the value of the golf tournament as it relates to scholarships and the economic benefit to the community.

For the six years from 2002 through 2007, the golf tournament as raised \$201,779 with an average of 33,629 per year. With the current tuition rate of \$1,600 per year, 126 students could have received funding. However, most scholarships are issued for an average of \$700, therefore, 288 students could have received substantial assistance!

Students who received at least \$700 of scholarship assistance and began career at \$12 per hour, created an economic benefit of \$7.2 million! With scholarships, many of these individuals moved from assistance programs into self-sufficiency thus accumulating additional economic benefits to the area.

To create scholarship funding in the amount of the golf tournament, the Foundation would need a cash investment of \$600,000 at 5% to

fund \$30,000 or \$700,000 to fund \$35,000 annually. The golf tournament has also been instrumental in generating more than \$50,000 in new scholarships through private companies and golf participants.

We would like to thank those who have partnered with the DATC Foundation as well as the community leaders who serve on the Foundation Board for the purpose of assisting the College in accomplishing its mission through procuring supplemental resources and by promoting business involvement, public awareness and building community support.

Special Appreciation is extended to all who continue to help enhance opportunities at the College through generous donations.

FOUNDATION GOALS



The New Manufacturing Technology Building Haven J. and Bonnie Rae Barlow Manufacturing Technology Building

During FY 2009, the Foundation is committed to completing its obligation to the Barlow Manufacturing Technology Building. The Foundation is working with the College to secure supplemental funding and equipment for the programs moving into this building.

This building will become the new home of Heavy Duty Diesel Technology, Machine Tool Technology, Electronics, Industrial Automation Maintenance, and Computer Aided Drafting and Design and will link education and skills with economic growth within the entire Northern Utah area and beyond.

This new building will provide learning areas specifically designed for programs located within the building. These programs have

consistent high demands for skilled employees with above average wages. The additional space will allow the College to respond to current industry growth and to fill employment vacancies left through retirement of employees.

Scholarships - Always a priority

Scholarship funding has been and continues to be a primary concern for the Foundation. With 70% to 75% of the adult students being in the low to moderate income level, providing scholarships becomes vital to the educational success of these individuals. In the past, the Foundation has provided between \$85,000 and \$120,000 annually for scholarships and tuition waivers. It is anticipated that this year will be similar to the previous years with \$85,000 already being allocate.

As is evidenced by the Foundation's mission statement, scholarship funding continues to be a priority for this body. Funding is made available for financial assistance to accommodate requests for need-based funding, merit-based awards, and awards to high school seniors.

Expansion of Entrepreneurial Opportunities Morgan Facility

The Morgan Educational/Economic Development Facility will function as a business incubator used to nurture young companies and help them to survive and grow during their start-up periods when they are most vulnerable to failure. The Center will provide assistance with business management, funding source location, and technical support. It will also provide educational opportunities for



high school students as well as public upgrade business training.

The Foundation is collaborating with Morgan County leaders to select a site for this facility as well as to secure private funding for the construction. Currently, the Foundation has secured funding through a 3-year Community Development Block Grant.

15th Annual Golf Tournament Golf Tournament

As we prepare for the 15th annual golf tournament, we are encouraged by the community support of this event. We continue to strive to achieve the \$40,000 level for student scholarships. This is the largest single event for the Foundation and each year numerous students receive educational funding from the tournament. We will once again have a shotgun start held at the Bountiful Ridge Golf Course on Wednesday, July 30, 2008 at 7:00 a.m.

Expanding Medical Wing of Davis Applied Technology College

During the coming year, the Foundation plans to develop a steering committee to explore all facets regarding the expansion of the DATC Medical Wing. Currently, some 45% of the stu-

dents attending the College are enrolled in one of the various medical and dental programs. The need for expanded space is critical and the Foundation will begin efforts to secure private funding for this project.

Completion of Virtual Nursing Lab

In March 2008, the College opened the new Virtual Healthcare Training Center which allows an increased enrollment of 10% in the Nursing Program while decreasing the required clinical training in hospitals by 25%. The Foundation was able to assist with the funding of this new center, however, there is still one item needed.


With the incredible medical facilities in our area focused on the care of children and newborn infants, our training center would be well served with the addition of the "Newbie" which is a simulated baby. With this addition, the students would be familiar with situations faced in newborn intensive care units and at Primary Children's Medical Center. During the coming year, the Foundation will seek funding in the amount of \$35,000 for the addition of a Newbie.
